Democracy

LD 1149 An Act to Require an Individual to Present Photographic Identification for the Purpose of Voting Summary:

This initiated bill requires the presentation of photographic identification for inperson and absentee voting. Acceptable forms of photographic identification include an unexpired Maine driver's license; nondriver ID (which is free); interim identification form issued by the Secretary of State; US passport or passport card; US military ID; Maine National Guard ID; and US Dept. of Veterans Affairs ID.

LD 1522 An Act to Establish the Maine Eviction Prevention Program

Summary:

Public Law 2023, chapter 643, Part KKKK, section 3 established an eviction prevention pilot program within the Maine State Housing Authority. This bill establishes the Maine Eviction Prevention Program as a permanent program within the authority and provides funding for the program. LD 1723 An Act to Amend the Laws Governing Manufactured Housing Communities to Prevent Excessive Rent and Fees Increases

Summary: This bill amends the declaration of purpose in the Manufactured Housing Act to include preventing excessive increases in lot rent to preserve manufactured housing as a source of affordable housing. The bill establishes a limitation on the amount lot rent may be increased within 4 years of 10% of the base rent. Rent limitations do not apply to resident-owned manufactured housing communities.

Flourishing is Mutual

Excerpts from Rev. Tori Rosati's sermon April 27

... First Parish signed on this year, to participate in the UUA's Climate Justice Revival. ... A climate justice focus urges us to acknowledge that climate collapse disproportionately harms the most vulnerable—those least responsible for it and least equipped to bear its weight. Climate justice is racial justice, is economic justice, Indigenous justice, is gender justice, is immigration justice is Earth justice and more. We are not facing separate environmental and social crises, but one intertwined crisis that calls us to confront poverty, restore dignity to the excluded, and protect the Earth through integrated solutions rooted in justice, compassion, and Love. ...

Love, at its heart, is about relationship. ... And right here in Maine, we can see a powerful example of that kind of love-in-action, an intersection between environmental care, Indigenous sovereignty, labor justice, and reciprocity. While Robin Kimmerer lifts up the Serviceberry in her book, here in Maine, we have the blueberry, a profound symbol of place and a driver of local economies and identity. ... For thousands of years, the five tribal nations of the Wabanaki people's ... seasonal migration patterns brought them through Maine to harvest wild blueberries in late summer—receiving these gifts with gratitude, reverence, and honor. But, like so much Indigenous land, it was taken and woven into a larger pattern of colonization that aimed not just at land acquisition, but at the erasure of Indigenous life, identity, wisdom, and selfdetermination.

In the 1980s, the Passamaquoddy Tribe began reclaiming stewardship of lands they had long held sacred—purchasing and managing wild blueberry barrens as a continuation of this enduring relationship. Forming the Passamaquoddy Blueberry Company, today they steward thousands of acres using sustainable and culturally grounded practices in doing so—connecting to their ancestors, repairing landscapes, and receiving the bountiful gifts of the land.

Furthermore, they give forward these gifts they receive. The company partners with seasonal migrant workers from indigenous communities on both sides of the Canadian-American border alongside migrant farmworkers. ... These communities converge every August, along with their children, who attend the Blueberry Harvest School. ...

This model—grounded in dignity, reciprocity, and care for both land and people—is a living example of what climate justice can look like in practice—that our work for justice is not just about systems, but about relationships to our history, the land and each other. Which is the same way of saying it is about love.

That is the moral logic of ecology. And the spiritual truth of our time. Our Climate Revival ... calls us to re-commit to a life of reverence and reciprocity. In this time when so much is being trampled underfoot, so much in need of repair, where the conditions for growth and life seem inhospitable, may we look for the gifts that push up through the soil—even the teensiest ones—the serviceberries, wild blueberries and strawberries, each other. And when we find them, may we meet them with gratitude, honor their gift with reverence, and keep nature's love of us flowing forward.


