Born out of Čapek's commitment to a free and inclusive faith during a time of rising oppression, it celebrates life and affirms the inherent worth and dignity of every person. brings a flower from home to contribute to a shared bouquet, symbolizing a community made vibrant by the unique gifts of all its members. This month's worship theme is Freedom. It feels fitting that we begin this exploration with music.


Singer/song writer Pete Seeger once said, "Songs are sneaky things. They can slip across borders. Proliferate in prisons. Penetrate hard shells." In many ways music is a vehicle for freedom—it helps us escape, helps name hard truths, endure challenge and pain, and hope for a new world. It also connects us—disregards the confines of time and space, culture and experience, the separation of individual bodies. It brings us together.

The music this morning has been chosen by the many talented musicians at First Parish—music that has helped them and others in times of struggle—turning outrage into action, tragedy into strength and connection, and despair into hope—offered to stretch us, soothe us, and help us imagine.

As we listen and sing together this morning, we invite you to reflect on how music has shown up for you in hard times. To consider: what music do you need to hear these days? And, how can music help us as a community move forward together through the hills and valleys of our time?

Let us, this morning lift our voices to the sounds of freedom—the bells, the notes, the chords, the chimes—honoring all the ways that music has shown up for us as a people, setting us free.

<u>Voter Guides</u> are available at Town Hall and on-line, at kennebunkmaine.us.



- Candidates are running for Select Board, RSU 21 Board, Kennebunk Light and Power District, and Kennebunk Sewer District.
- Town budget, School budget, and School budget validation will also be decided.
- Zoning Article: intended to reduce setback requirement for cellular service, in accordance with new technology.
- Pay as You Throw disposal: To see if the Town will vote to eliminate the Pay-As-You-Throw (PAYT) program; and to raise and appropriate \$669,000 in addition to the amounts raised and appropriated in Article 3 of this warrant, for the collection, transportation and disposal of solid waste
