Continuing the Conversation

Reflection by Rev. Lara Campbell, Jan. 15

I want to re-read one of the paragraphs from the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s *Letter from Birmingham City Jail* that was read earlier, because frankly, it haunts me.

First, I must confess that over the last few years I have been gravely disappointed with the white moderate. I have almost reached the regrettable conclusion that the Negro's great stumbling block in the stride toward freedom is not the White Citizen's Counciler or the Ku Klux Klanner, but the white moderate who is more devoted to "order" than to justice ...

. . .

How often have we found ourselves telling people of color "I agree with you in the goal you seek, but I can't agree with your methods of direct action;" or today's equivalent, "can they come up with a different slogan?" ...

Just as black people must face uncertainty every day of their lives, it is our responsibility to continue questioning systems and our society. To continue asking, "What is my next task in this struggle?"


My friends, make no mistake - I am so, so proud of all that we have done together. But I know for myself that standing out on the sidewalk is meaningless if I'm not making informed choices about where I spend my money. It is easy to remain comfortable when it is not our bodies on the line. When it is not our freedoms that are being taken away. Or when it is not our family members who are dying. ...

We must ask ourselves honestly: am I the white moderate that King was writing to from his cell in the Birmingham Jail? If I am honest with myself and with you, yes. Yes, I am. ...

There is a growing movement in this country that, if they get their way, would strip so many of the freedoms that people died for in the fights for justice. And we—we, white moderates; we, UUs—are being asked to step out of our comfortable spaces. To follow leaders of color whose voices are finally, after centuries, being amplified.

We cannot be complacent my friends. We must continue the conversation that Dr. King's letter started.

Our own players present Gilgamesh!

Sunday Service, Jan. 22, 10 a.m.

The Epic of Gilgamesh first took embryonic form in Sumer (southern Iraq) about 5,000 years ago and then underwent a more poetic literary revision further north in Babylon about 3,000 years ago. Then, 500 years later, the epic lay buried deep beneath the tons of rubble of Assyrian King Ashurbanipal's sacked and burned Nineveh library, only to be resurrected in 1872 by a British archeologist who shipped its 11 Akkadian cuneiform tablets, among more

than ten thousand others, to the British Museum. Soon thereafter, these now treasured 11 were translated to English.

"Since then, the epic has swept like a flood across the literary world, captivating readers across the globe. Printed in millions of copies and translated into two dozen languages (including Klingon), *Gilgamesh* would seem an unlikely best seller." Who would have thought that a story composed three millennia ago could appeal so strongly to readers now living in a text-message TikTok world? What possible relevance could this epic have to offer us, here and now, regarding life and death, friendship and love and the unquenchable human thirst for meaning and fulfillment?

On Sunday, January 22, at 10 a.m., please join us for a Worship Service, THE EPIC OF GILGAMESH: THE NAÏVE HERO'S QUEST FOR IMMORTALITY by Lyrical Austrian Poet Rainer Marie Rilke (1916). It will begin with an abridged version of our customary Order of Service, followed by a two-act play with Maggie and Nick Bartenhagen, Crow Lowry and Ted Trainer. The script derives from this ancient epic, deeply rooted in the fertile soil of Mesopotamian myth, offering us a deeper meaning for being alive and being here today.

A closing note: it is possible that this hybrid approach may result in a slightly prolonged Service.

Need a ride? Give a ride.

A new ride service is available from the Town of Kennebunk. It's called the Kennector. Rides are available to Kennebunk, Kennebunkport and Arundel residents for any daily needs Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. - 2 p.m. The service area is a 15-mile radius in any direction from Kennebunk.

Rides are in private vehicles by trained and vetted drivers. There is a \$2.00 base fee + \$.50 per mile with a \$5.00 minimum. No cash is needed. Riders prepay from their own account, which they set up with the town. For more information call 207 604-1366 to

We need your help! Thank you for keeping our community safe.




