Springing out of a somewhat random Christmas breakfast conversation in 2011, this event has become a settled tradition in the Pacitti-Campbell family. Choir Notes

Christmas with the FPUU choir Margaret Jones

Since 1988, I've been singing with the choir and the holiday season is an important one for me. I love it because the music is so familiar. Melodies like "Joy to the World" or "Oh Little Town of Bethlehem" bring me back to my childhood. It was a time of family gatherings, decorating the tree, Christmas cookies and going to church.

In the choir we sing a mix of familiar pieces such as the one we will be singing this year, "Rise Up Shephard" as well as new pieces. Several years ago, Charlie Grindle taught us to sing "A Child is Born", a rousing choral piece with multiple parts. I still find myself humming the melody even though it has been years since I learned it. That's the power of music.

Molly, our fearless choir director, brings inspiring pieces for us to learn. Although some of the music is difficult, I know that she will guide us through it. Also, I have a community who is in this with me. I am never alone when it comes to singing music for the holidays! Especially when additional church members join the choir for Christmas Eve services. Sometimes we are so large, we spill out of the choir loft and have to stand in the aisles. The more the merrier when it comes to singing together. Each year we have a holiday party where we appreciate one another by sharing food and the gift of song.

Since Unitarian Universalism honors all faiths, the choir has a wide range of music to select from. Under Molly's guidance we oftentimes sing inspiring pieces from other religions. Sometimes the music has a pagan theme such as the Winter Solstice or a non-Christian theme like Hanukkah or Ramadan.

Singing at this time of year is deeply rewarding for me. Music is nonjudgmental; inclusive. It brings people together during times when we need it the most. On Christmas Eve, the lights dim and each of us raises a candle into the dark. We sing "Silent Night" and the song lingers in the air, holding the moment and the memory of Christmas. I cherish these moments because I am part of a community that celebrates the love we have for each other in this sacred time of year.

From the Archives

December 2019

1778- excerpt from "History of Kennebunk" by E. E Bourne

"At this period there was great suffering in the army from the lack of suitable clothing, and the Legislature called on the people to do what they could in the way of contribution. There were many of the townsmen in the army, and one would have supposed that the hearts of the people would have called forth a generous response, more especially when the articles needed were the product of domestic industry, and easily furnished by almost every family. We insert here the result in one district of the town...

"An account of the number of shirts and pairs of stockings and shoes delivered to Stephen Titcomb by the inhabitants of the Second Parish in Wells, as a present for the Continental army, agreeable to a request of the General Court of the State of Massachusetts Bay, began to be collected the 9th of April 1778:
