# 🐕 Choir Notes 🎲

There have been long time members of the Kennebunk UU choir who have moved on to different climes - one now living in San Francisco. Paula Moulton was mentioned in an earlier article about choir and I followed through on the temptation to do a bit of an interview with her by phone.

Paula tells of starting her church singing in her 20's and she's now 82 - still a part time member of a UU choir. She tells that at one time there was no choir at First Parish UU in Kennebunk. At that time Sunday music was provided by her solo singing and by the organist. She tells it was always important to coordinate with the minister to sing music relevant to the theme of the service. This, of course, is an ongoing practice to this day.

Paula recalls singing solo every other Sunday until that commitment became difficult to sustain. Then around that time the organist also became choir director and there emerged a small number of folks who enjoyed singing. She recalls choir members arranging themselves in the narrow choir loft at the back of the church around the organist.

She also recalls that at one time before there was a choir that there were young boys who would crouch down to hand power the organ before it became electrified. In a very recent year when our previous music director Charlie Grindle was playing the organ a problem arose with the electric motor for the organ. Ian Durham's son came to our rescue - crouching into that small space to hand power the bellows. A very memorable event.

She fondly recalls Kathy Rochon who had a choir director's special abilities to inspire interest, enthusiasm and find music with the right level of challenge that is also appropriate in its lyrics for the unique Unitarian service.

Choir makes memories, builds camaraderie and friendships, brings out and builds upon latent musical skills. And introduces new choir directors with unique leadership skills such as we now have with our Molly Petrik. Only at certain times - such as Christmas or Solstice - do we crowd into the back-choir loft as we now have a beautiful piano to accompany us donated by Jaylene Summers and Rich Gaito.

Paula remarks that music is the heart of the church. There is a magic in the harmonies of choir singing that lifts even the weariest of hearts. The size of the choir swells and contracts and there is always joy to welcome new singers. Ginny Lawrence

#### From the Archives

February 2020

#### George Wells

Our third minister was George W. Wells of Boston. He served from 1827-1838. While other Sunday schools in Maine tended to be formed and then expire, at least temporarily, ours happily continued uninterrupted through this difficult period when Maine was first being admitted to the Union. We are able to claim that ours is the oldest Sunday school in the State of Maine that has maintained continued existence.

Rev. Wells was a very young minister, a diligent activist and our Sunday school was greatly stimulated under his guidance by the formation of the "Kennebunk Sunday School Society. It had been apparent that a number of poor children would need clothing from time to time to enable them to attend Sunday school, and on the evening of March 12, 1829, the young ladies of the parish met at the Home of Col. Enoch Hardy, (three doors down from what is now the Police Station on Summer Street.)

The members were quite ingenious in developing marketable items which they could produce such as fancy items for fairs and other organizations. A paper lantern that Rev. Wells had noticed on a trip to Boston was copied and became a very popular item. At the same time the Society managed to supply sheets and pillowcases to needy families in times of sickness, and the annual fairs that came later in the century were most productive. Eventually the interests of the Society went beyond the Sunday School to fund other projects both within and outside of the parish.

# A Little History on Our Paul Revere Bell

Our Historian had written a letter to the Massachusetts Historical Society to try and get clarification as to if Paul Revere were here himself, here is the response!

Hello! I am the newest Historian at First Parish UU in Kennebunk Maine. We have an 1803 Revere Bell and I have been asked if there is some way to follow up on a rumor that Paul Revere himself came to supervise the installation of the bell in the 1803-1804 time period. I imagine if there are business records still extant about the day to day there might be a hint. I have looked at what we have in our archives (certainly not a complete record of our history) and have not found reference. Hope you can help with this. Maine is celebrating our Bi-Centennial as a state this year and suddenly everyone is interested in history! That's a good thing K. Tolstrup

#### **Response:**

Dear Ms. Tolstrup,

Thank you for contacting the Massachusetts Historical Society with your question about the installation of your Revere Bell! My name is Hannah Elder and I am a library assistant here at the Society. I'm originally from Maine, and I'm so glad to hear that the bicentennial is leading to a renewed interest in history! I took a quick look through the microfilm version of the Revere Family Papers (https://www.masshist.org/collection-guides/view/fa0017), including Reels 2 and 5, which include materials such as business papers and family letters from the time your bell was installed. Unfortunately, I was unable to confirm or deny whether Revere participated in the instillation of the bell, though the information I did find seems to indicate that Revere was not present. According to Volume 5, a wastebook covering June 1804-July 1811, Revere received payment of \$452.28 from the "Town of Kennebunk (parish of Wells)" for "a Bell" on August 14, 1804. The heading on the entry was "Boston 1804." Additionally, I could not find any evidence on Reel 2 (loose papers for 1802-1813) that Revere was traveling in August 1804, so it seems likely to me that Revere was in Boston at the time.

I'm sorry I couldn't provide a more concrete answer, but I hope this information is helpful! If you have any further questions, please do not hesitate to ask.
