# Fundraising to support the Free Black Community archaeological dig!

Kennebunk is home to one of the few known Free Black Communities in Maine. I have been working with Kathy Ostrander-Roberts to secure funding of phase 2 of the archeological dig.

We have been offered a **challenge match** from a member of our congregation who wishes to remain anonymous. If we raise \$1000 the donor will match that amount. Please help us to support this important archaeological dig. The goal is to have the location designated as a National Register Historic District. So far we are about half way to reaching the match amount.

**Please note:** It is critically important that the site remain undisturbed. If you know the location, please do not disclose it. If you think you know the location, please don't disclose it. If you have any curiosity about the site – please, please, please, resist any temptation you might have to go looking for it. In order to retain the historic nature of the site we need to leave the area alone. We are concerned that scavengers will destroy the site before we can get the dig under motion. We implore you to treat this information with the utmost care and respect.

You may drop off a contribution to this project at FPUU any time. If you write a check please put freed slaves project in the memo. Feel free to ask me any questions you might have about this important project. Thank you, Rev. Lara



### **Steeple Project – Phase 2 Commencement**

This week is the start of the steeple project, phase 2, that will complete the painting and repairs of the belfry and clock area that was not completed last year. It will also involve the tightening of the steeple vestibule's flooring via the half cellar and adding mortar to the west side foundation. This will take approximately three to four weeks in total with the 120-foot Ariel-Lift coming next Monday, June 3 for two weeks.

Please be cautious and attentive to equipment on the premises and the use of Reverend Lara's parking area to store a work trailer.

#### **WIONN (Welcoming Immigrants Our New Neighbors) Request**

There are refugee families in Biddeford that need what we call Care Teams. A Care Team is a person or group of people who commit to up to 2 years of attention to a family. The Care Team gets to know the family, visiting once every 2 weeks or so for a while, then less time as a family gets acclimated. It is mostly about friendship and caring about them. We have access to household goods, clothing, shoes etc. and we have a group of people who all work together. We have a training for Care Teams and lots of support. #### THE REVERE BELL

A Revere bell is a prized possession of any institution lucky enough to own one, and FPUU is one of the lucky ones.

Cast in 1803, the bell was purchased in 1804 and installed and rung in the fall. The bell has a very strong, clear tone and was used for many purposes. Once in 1824, in its capacity as a fire alarm for a local fire, it could be heard in Shaker Hill in Alfred, eleven miles distant.

Weekdays the bell was rung at seven a.m., noon, and as a curfew at nine p.m. The curfew ring also was supplemented by one stroke for each day of the month- so on the first of the month, one extra stroke was struck. On the last day, it is easy to imagine that it could get fairly tedious, possibly leading to the discontinuation of the practice in 1816.

The ringing of the bell was a great convenience to the farmers and others, many of whom did not, at that period have the means to afford a timepiece. Consequently, there was an annual public subscription to defray the costs of ringing and maintenance.

When the first factory opened in town, it rang a bell to alert the employees of start, lunch and end of shift and the Revere Bell reverted to church-related functions and time. The first bell in York County was installed in the York meeting house in 1788. Ours is the second bell in the county and third in the District of Maine.

Hundreds of visitors have climbed the many steps and ladders to view the bell and the view. Many have stopped on the way to add their names to a wall covered with signatures, many dating from the 1800's. Among them is Prescott Littlefield, who signed in 1859. He was a well-known figure in town as the driver of the town's grocery cart.

I have put up a photo of him standing in the belfry next to the bell in the From The Archives "gallery" in the main hallway. Be sure to stop and take a look.

I will be back in the Fall with more interesting information from the Archives. Have a great summer!
