#### **Special Notice from the Board of Directors**

In order to support the health and well-being of the congregation, The Board of Directors voted unanimously on 3/18/2020 to close the building effective Friday 3/20/2020. It will remain closed until further notice. We made this decision upon the recommendations of the Congregational Well-Being Task Force and after deep and careful consideration, rooted in best practices as described by the CDC and the Unitarian Universalist Association. We are not in a position to be able to keep up with the significant cleaning required to ensure the safety of all that use our building. All Groups, events and rentals have either been moved online, cancelled or postponed. There will be a limited number of individuals that will be checking the building daily.

#### Online Worship Service – how to join the service

To participate in the online worship service, we are using a technology called **Zoom(link is external)**, which is online ("cloud-based") videoconferencing software.

There are three ways to join the service:

- From your phone or tablet, by downloading the zoom app. [Apple iOS(link is external)] [Android(link is external)]
- From a laptop or desktop computer [download(link is external)]
- By telephone (audio only)

You should have the software downloaded and installed on your device before the service starts.

#### Porch "Drop Box"

We are installing a small black mail "drop box" by the outside porch door. This will allow you to drop off pledges, Hannaford, and the like. Please do not leave any cash or valuables in the box. You should use the "milk box" on the porch for larger communications. Clynk bags will be left in the "milk-box"

#### For Committees and Groups to Go Online

The Congregational Well-Being Task Force is discouraging in-person meetings of all kinds. With that said, if you are willing and able, we do encourage your committees and groups to meet virtually. We have resources available to help you get set up for a successful online meeting. Please contact Hervé Lavoie or Chris Wells from the directory for technical assistance.

There are three main services which can help you:

- <u>Zoom(link is external)</u> the same service used for the Sunday Services. There is a paid account available to host the meetings with. This is the recommended method for hosting virtual meetings. Supports mobile devices, laptops/desktops, and call-in.
- <u>Google Meet(link is external)</u> a free service from Google for online videoconferencing. Supports mobile devices, laptops/desktops, and call-in.
- <u>Uberconference(link is external)</u> another free service which is simple to use, with excellent call-in support and screen sharing. May be the best option to have a traditional "conference call" but get some extra features.

All things considered, all three of these services have nearly identical features. A lot of it comes down to your level of comfort with the user interfaces of each. We encourage you to try out and get comfortable with one, or try them all to see which you prefer the most. NOTE: The church has a paid Zoom account which will let your church-related group/committee host meetings without any of the free account limitations (ex.g. 40-minute meetings of more than 2 people).
