## The Power of Our Shared Ministry

Each of us at First Parish Unitarian Universalist Church shares in the total ministry of our church and works to ensure its continued health and well- being. The Committee on Ministry, composed of our minister and five members is charged with the responsibility of monitoring and helping to support the minister, the members, and the congregation as a whole.

As part of that responsibility, the Committee of Ministry is highlighting examples of shared ministry in action, both the small, often unseen acts and the larger, more public ones and is including a way for you to get involved if you're interested.

An act that may be unseen to members of the congregation but can be both large and public is the service Susan Jack provides as Wedding Coordinator for couples wishing to book our church building as a wedding venue. To date Susan has coordinated fifteen weddings and one vow renewal service. Acting as a liaison with the couple, she provides an initial tour, helps them plan the ceremony, provides the set-up for the rehearsal and wedding, manages the wedding party and photographer, receives the flowers, shepherds the guests, and cues the bridal party to begin the ceremony. She also maintains the pristine white tablecloths for any reception at the church afterwards and suggests ways to best deal with the layout and location of the church.

#### Happy 200th Birthday Religious Education!

On May 16, 1819 Reverend Nathaniel Fletcher, second minister of the then Second Congregational Parish in Wells founded, with the assistance of John Law and Daniel Sewell, the first Sunday School Maine. He got the idea from a visit to a church in Portsmouth, N.H. A notice in the Kennebunk Gazette invited people to send their children for religious instruction. Since at the time, it was the only church in town, children of any denomination were welcome. It was a huge success as there were 216 children signed up necessitating the recruitment of 30 teachers.

Miss Olivia Emerson was one of the first teachers. Some of her comments: "Daniel Thompson is my best boy. He is regular in attendance, listens attentively. Horace Young is regular in his duties, but, like all the rest, is deficient in that which we most wish to impress upon him. Moody Couliard has several times shown disposition to rebel."

By January in 1829 teacher William Lord could report: "Class No. 17 have generally recited their lessons well. Horace Porter and Henry Smith at times need correction. Horace Hubbard has generally the best disposition, however he is not without his faults. I have every reason to hope as they come forward in life, they will do away with their faults and make useful members of society."

For a sample of thinking about religious instruction for children in those early days, I give you a brief sample of a very long disquisition from Rev. George Wells, 3rd Minister 1827-38. "Another important consideration, one which may well be mentioned here, is Prayer. What is more calculated to incite devotional feeling in the heart of a child as a knowledge of the wisdom and goodness of its Creator? Impressed as it may be, how conceivable that it should give utterance to its thoughts and feelings, and what form would so naturally suggest itself as Prayer."

By the first half of the 20th century the Sunday School functioned independently and increasingly, the children developed a social awareness of their own. In April of 1938 all children of the Church School signed a letter congratulating the Children of the First Unitarian Society of Marietta, Ohio on being the first Unitarian Society founded in the Northwest Territory by pioneers from New England. In 1962 the Liberal Religious Youth group formed. David Clark, a senior at Kennebunk High was the first President. He was followed in that role by Peter Burr who has done much of the historical research upon which this column relies. The LRY became an attractive option for all the local teens, culminating in the 'Heretic Coffee House' which met in the church basement.

Jumping forward to the 1982-83 RE season the calendar of events included overnights for 9-12-year olds, beach picnic at Goose Rock, Halloween for UNICEF, Christmas pageant, Chinese New Year Celebration, Spaceship Earth ecology month, Easter/Passover celebration, and Flower Communion. Certainly one of the strengths through time has been the ability for the Sunday School/RE to change with the times and offer what the children and young adults need. We have good reason to be proud of our RE instructors and the children that come here to learn about an ethical and humane life.
