The Ministerial Discretionary Fund

Choir Notes

November 2020 **The Beauty of Adaptation**

To start, our wonderfully world-conscious and reality-based congregation did the right thing and is STILL doing the right thing. As you are all aware, we have spent the past few months holding services, committee meetings, workshops, etc., on a "Zoom" machine thingy. I am, for one, incredibly pleased with what we have been able to accomplish in such a short time. I'm astonished at how smooth and routine our work as a congregation has become in this new and unexpected environment. Especially as developments and learning curves came quickly and ominously at the start of our present unfortunate world-wide condition. We are also blessed to have so many knowledgeable people to assist us.

But this is "Choir Notes". So, I will lavish most of my praise and thankfulness on that robust and august church entity guided by our own Music Director, Molly Petrik. To put it short, with Molly's skilled and ardent direction, and with each choir member's willingness to learn new things, we pulled together and found new ways to lift our voices as one in worship.

Most notable is how we've learned to build "collage music videos". Here is basically how it works: After online choir meetings to give us the basics, Molly arranges the music and records multiple tracks (different harmony parts) with a count-in and a metronome-track (more commonly: "click track"). That video is then shared with each choir member. The choir member puts the director's video on one device with headphones and uses another device to record their own video using the count-in, click track, voice, visual cues, and sheet music. Then, each choir member shares their video with Molly. Molly extracts the individual audio tracks and synchronizes each voice. (Just bear in mind that The Beatles could only work with 4 tracks at a time. Molly can work with up to 255 tracks.) Molly sends the "Master Audio" to the video editor (usually me) for editing and synchronizing with each individual video. Modern video editors allow you to shrink and show each individual video on the same screen for rendering into one video. You can also move them around and add effects. That's it in a nutshell. It's not too hard to understand. It's mostly just tedious.....at times. Each of our new videos get better and better.

Now there is more that any congregant can do whether you are a choir member or not. You are now encouraged to submit your own video for archive and presentation as it is appropriate to a given service. Molly and The Music Committee encourage you to be your own self and create music videos independently. You can contact any of our techies if you need help on the technical side. It's a marvelous idea. And, think of it this way: You can do multiple takes until your performance is perfect. You won't have the pressure of live performance. Lift your voices as best as you are able, with whatever technology you have.


Hope, meditate and pray that we will be safely present in the same room with each other, soon. With as much fun as I find the technology to be, I would really rather be with YOU!

NAVIGATION ON THE MOUSAM RIVER

ROM the time previous to the Revolution up to a little later than 1800, quite twenty vessels were built up and down the Mousam River. A contract is yet extant of such a piece of work here.

Although two considerable efforts were made to make the river more navigable, the ships were warped and towed to the outlet of the stream with difficulty because of the shoals.

It would be of paramount interest could we but look backward for a glimpse into the curtained past and behold the ship-yard upon the gala occasion of some launching day. To evidence the commendable pride of one citizen then, it may be noted that nearly one hundred years ago one of them writes: "Within a few weeks there have been built in Kennebunk yards, five brigs and one ship, all of white oak and copper fastened, as good as Med-

ford or Duxbury vessels, and in foreign ports they should obtain freights as quickly."

In 1792 a company known as "The Proprietors of the Mousam Canal" was formed to cut a new channel for the Mousam River and the company was empowered to take toll on all lumber passing through the new canal. In 1793 a dam was built across the river near the old mouth and a new outlet was cut west of Great Hill. Just then a storm arose, the dam was broken, the river resumed its old channel and the new outlet filled up.

The work was taken up again and this time the channel was cut so as to go to the eastward of Great Hill to the Cove. The first vessel went through the new canal on February 1, 1794. This channel did not provide a good depth of water and in 1846 the present outlet to the west of Great Hill was dug.

Outreach Services

Community Outreach Services - COS

COS offers assistance: food, fuel and many other things, to our neighbors in Kennebunk, Kennebunkport and Arundel. It is a simple 2 step process. To make an appointment:

- 1) contact the General Assistance office of your town and they can help you, or
- 2) Go online to https://calendly.com/cosfoodpantry/foodpantryvisit to select a 10-minute time slot. After you confirm your time you will be forwarded to a website to provide COS with your Food Pantry preferences. This pantry provides fresh produce, meats and dairy items along with non-perishable foods such as canned goods, cereal, pasta, pet food, household items, etc.

You may pick up your food during your scheduled appointment time at the COS Food Pantry, 19 Park Street in Kennebunk (driveway to the left behind the playing fields).

Appointments can be made for Mondays 12pm-3pm, Tuesdays and Thursdays 3pm-6pm and Fridays 10am-1pm.

Note: Also, for now appointments can be made for the Produce Pantry held Fridays 9am-10am (does not include non-perishable items).

To donate food to COS: just drop your items in the bins at Hannaford in Kennebunk. Thank you!
