Social Justice transforms at First Parish

First Parish is undergoing a transition regarding the Social Justice Committee. At our fall meeting we learned that four members were resigning, bringing to six those who have left since last year at this time. This leaves a group of six dedicated folks who decided it's time to transform this essential part of our church community.

Over the past few years, we've accomplished a lot. Regarding Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, we started the vibrant community-wide group, Many Towns One Circle, which is ongoing. We now contribute more than ever to community programs through our Share the Offering program. We fly flags to acknowledge our country and the issues dearest to our hearts. We continue to sponsor an event honoring the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. — next January, we will hold the 18th annual celebration!

The Committee decided to change from the committee format to a Social Justice Network that encompasses the whole congregation. Through the Network, our church will continue working on issues that we most care about. Here are a few examples: No Place Like Home, which was created by our former chair, Molly Hoadley, provides services for our elders; Welcoming Immigrants Our New Neighbors, which Marylyn Wentworth and others continue to serve; the Green Sanctuary project, which is being carried out by our Properties Committee; Community Outreach Services, for which Kathe Wright has served as liaison; Wabanaki Reach through which Bob Wuerthner is working to address Indian Affairs; and membership in Maine Unitarian Universalist Social Action Committee known as MUUSAN, which works on social justice issues at the state level. Social Justice at First Parish is growing far beyond the committee level!

Rev. Lara inspires students at KHS

Rev. Lara made a presentation to the "Race in America" class at Kennebunk High School in September, and one of the students covered the story in the student newspaper, *The Herd*. Here is his article.

Removed Pews Of Kennebunk Church Reveal A History Of Slavery In Maine

It is widely assumed that slavery was abolished throughout the Union as early as 1780, right after the United States gained its independence from England. However, that wasn't the case.

Recently, Reverend Lara Campbell of the Unitarian Universalist Church, has uncovered historical documents that provide evidence to the notion that there was in fact slavery in Kennebunk, dating back to as late as 1805.

Campbell's interest piqued when she discovered a peculiar outline of pews that had been removed in the belfry of the church. She decided to dig into the archives of the church to try and uncover the origin of what she was looking at, and in doing so, found these documents.

These documents highlight the process and payment of the building of the Unitarian Universalist Church. Within the writing, architect Thomas Eaton states the need to "build a suitable place in the belfry, of three or more seats, for the people of Colour to sit."

Campbell was quite shocked when she found these papers, as they deliver direct evidence to the mysterious outline of pews being built for the black community of Kennebunk.

She then stumbled upon a parchment that inventoried the net value of the household. Near the bottom, the document mentions that one of the items of the house was "1 negro wench named Phillis" who was worth \$30. Campbell's research has uncovered that there were indeed slaves in Kennebunk, and the removed pews in the Unitarian Universalist Church were originally built for the enslaved population of Kennebunk.

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What does this mean?

It's a lot to process the idea that there were slaves in New England as late as the early 1800s, especially when many students learned otherwise in their history textbooks. What does this actually imply? Well, this discovery may just be more proof that history shouldn't be taken at face value but should be researched and questioned in order to gain a deeper and more true understanding of what has transpired throughout history, specifically North America.

How do we proceed?

The last and perhaps most important question is: How do we proceed? The town of Kennebunk has yet to recognize any of this history, and there have been discussions about what can and should be done in order to honor these unpronounced members of Kennebunk's history. In Kennebunk High School's Race in America class, students discussed their opinions on what should be done. The most prominent ideas were placing plaques of memorial on the historical houses where these slaves lived in order to pay respects or creating an exhibit in Kennebunk's Brick Store Museum. However, it is up to the town to decide if anything will be done.

First Parish has long included in its tours and written history the fact that this "Negro balcony" existed, but little else was known. Newsletter editor
