
In Search of People Who Live in Adopted Families

UU Wellspring

What is UU Wellspring?

UU Wellspring is a 10-month Unitarian Universalist program of spiritual deepening and connection. It offers participants an opportunity for spiritual deepening that leads to more joyful living, increased congregational leadership, and faithful justice making in their lives and in their communities. UU Wellspring is for congregations interested in fostering spiritual growth in a uniquely UU context through an intentional, curriculum-based program of daily spiritual practice, spiritual direction, study and reflection, and small group meetings. Since its development in 2005, UU Wellspring programs have been implemented in more than 26 congregations nationwide.

How did UU Wellspring get started at FPUU?

Over the past 5 years a number of folks have expressed to Rev. Lara a desire to do some deeper spiritual work. When discussing this issue with our sabbatical minister, Rev. Kimberley Debus, offered to lead a few workshops on spiritual practices to introduce the topic to the congregation. After the completion of those workshops, Rev. Kimberley shared information about UU Wellspring as a way that First Parish could offer spiritual deepening opportunities. Rev. Kimberley has been involved with UU Wellspring for many years, as a participant, a curriculum developer, a mentor/leader, and a board member. After careful investigation and deliberation, the First Parish Board of Directors voted unanimously to bring UU Wellspring to our congregation.

How is UU Wellspring going to work?

This first year is a pilot year. Ten individuals, including Rev. Lara, were recruited to participate in the initial preliminary program. Invitations to the trial program were sent to folks who, at some point, had expressed a desire and commitment to their ongoing spiritual growth. This pilot group consists of 5 newer (under 5 years) members/friends and 4 longer time (over 5 years) members/friends.

What will happen going forward?

Our goal is to formally launch UU Wellspring to the congregation next year. Some of the pilot participants will go on to co-facilitate groups next year and some will choose not to. We are hoping to offer multiple sessions of UU Wellspring in the fall 2020 for all members/friends who wish to participate.

From the Archives

More from Reverend Little's Diary Chiefly concerning the Indians

"This evening came into Capt. Pembleton's, three men from Bagaduce, who report that the Indians have been drawn from the head of the tide, great part of them some time ago, that two men from the upper settlement had been up to the Indian old town and found it picked in, that the inhabitants were alarmed."

"Took passage in Mr. Hankins boat for Bagaduce- ended up at Dr. Man's - Enquired into the rumor about the Indians. Mr. Treet's account was handed to me in a paper, signed by him the 27th July - was in substance, the following- that two Indians by name Ausory Neptune and Pictsauk say that 'Agreeable to promise to Gen Washington, they come to give information of approaching danger to the inhabitants, viz That a large body of southern Indians had met at Montreal and there held a Council, and had sent a belt of Wampum and a Hatchet to a certain Tribe which was also sent to them 5 days ago at Passadumkee under this restriction, that if they did not join them to destroy the Inhabitants, they would destroy all their women and children by Indians throughout; and that they had assurance from the Governour of Canada to assist them with warlike stores, and if occasion called, they would assist them with 9,000 men from St. Johns and 7,000 from Canada.' ...

The people at Bagaduce upon the above information sent two men up to the Indian town to enquire further, from whom they have not as yet received any certain intelligence. The general absence of Indians gives ground of suspicion that something not friendly is in contemplation."

Clearly the forces of both France and England were using Natives to do their work and endangering both the tribes on both sides and the settlers. Rev. Little was very much engaged throughout his many years on horseback through the wilderness to try to contact and bring the Gospel to them. While we in the 21st Century may have different ideas about the appropriateness of his attempts, this is a fascinating glimpse into a different time in the Province of Maine.
